
In Psalm 145 the author says "all thy works shall praise thee" and list several that are attributed to Him; he feeds, he lifts up, he is near, he provides, protects.

## James 2

My brothers, show no partiality as you hold the faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory. <sup>2</sup> For if a man wearing a gold ring and fine clothing comes into your assembly, and a poor man in shabby clothing also comes in, <sup>3</sup> and if you pay attention to the one who wears the fine clothing and say, "You sit here in a good place," while you say to the poor man, "You stand over there," or, "Sit down at my feet," 4 have you not then made distinctions among yourselves and become judges... <sup>6</sup> But you have dishonored the poor man.

Throughout scripture, Jesus takes little to no thought of anyone's social status when it comes to His interaction with them concerning salvation.

He had a strong aversion to cooking..." "When I began my work I said to God with filial trust: 'My God, since you are with me, and since I must apply myself to these duties by your order, I beg you to give me the grace to remain with you and keep you company. Even better, my Lord, work with me, accept my efforts and take possession of all my affections.' Thus during my work I continued to speak intimately with him, offering him my services, asking him for his graces."

"The times of activity are not at all different from the hours of prayer, for I possess God as peacefully in the commotion of my kitchen, where often people are asking me for different things at the same time, as I do when kneeling in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

Validity, self-worth, and satisfaction are only brought to righteous fruition because God Himself calls us His own sons and daughters.
